Additional Problems

- There are n socks (3 of which are red) in a drawer. What is the value of n such that when 2 of the socks are chosen, the probability that both are red is $\frac{1}{2}$? What assumptions are being made?
- A poker hand consists of 5 cards dealt from a standard 52-card deck.* If it is assumed that all poker hands are equally likely, what is the probability of being dealt:
 - A flush? (A hand is said to be a flush if all 5 cards are of the same suit.)
 - One pair? (This occurs when the cards have ranks a, a, b, c, d , where a, b, c , and d are all distinct.)
 - Two pairs? (This occurs when the cards have ranks a, a, b, b, c , where a, b , and c are all distinct.)
 - Three of a kind? (This occurs when the cards have ranks a, a, a, b, c , where a, b , and c are all distinct.)
 - Four of a kind? (This occurs when the cards have ranks a, a, a, a, b , where a and b are distinct.)

*A standard 52-card deck consists of 13 cards of each of the four *suits*: clubs (♣), diamonds (♦), hearts (♥), and spades (♠). Within each suit, each of the 13 cards has a different *rank*: ace, king, queen, jack, 10, 9, . . . , 2.
